<b>Brentwood News:</b>	<ol style="list-style-type: none"><li>1. Christmas chaos could be on the cards for Brentwood Town Centre this year unless Brentwood Council gets its act together to replace parking spaces lost in William Hunter Way when development gets underway. SHOPPERS and homeowners could face months of disruption with confirmation that development of the William Hunter Way site is set to start this autumn. The scheme was finally anchored after M&amp;S formally agreed to fill the 26,000 sq ft store, which will feature alongside it a six-screen cinema, ten-storey car park and 14 town centre homes. Waitrose, which had been in the running since plans were first mooted, has now effectively ruled itself out altogether from Brentwood. That decision leaves M&amp;S and the landlord Topland having to look for another retailer to fill the high street premises when it is eventually vacated in 2013. Duncan Tindale, development director at William Hunter developers <a href="#">Stockland</a>, said: "We're looking to build further momentum with more leases to be signed in the coming months and ahead of construction of the multi-million pound scheme starting this autumn." Despite the impending work, which could coincide with the Town Hall refurbishment, <a href="#">Brentwood Borough Council</a> is yet to draw up plans for working hours and practices and, importantly, identify an alternative to more than 400 parking spaces temporarily lost while building is carried out. A Brentwood Borough Council spokesperson said: "The council will ensure that parking facilities in Brentwood during the work on the William Hunter Way development to provide the best option for shoppers, local traders and drivers and parkers."</li><li>2. Scores on the doors of food establishments are meant to give consumers information about food hygiene standards at that particular location but</li></ol>

there is some controversy over the fairness of the scheme with some business claiming the scores awarded by Brentwood Council's environmental health officers do not reflect the true picture.

THE controversial star ratings are part of a scheme to "bring about an overall improvement in food hygiene standards", insist council experts.

[Brentwood council](#)'s Environmental Health services have defended the joint venture with the [Food Standards Agency](#) this week.

A council spokesman said: "It is a natural consequence of being given a low score that food business operators will want to improve on this as it is the first time their standards are visible within the public domain.

"For this reason food businesses will increasingly question the scores given as they naturally link this with the success, or otherwise, of their business.

"Environmental Health officers should always be prepared to explain the score given in every circumstance so that businesses can understand the significance of the contraventions found and how this may impact upon their score."

The [Bell pub](#), in Ingatestone High Street, was among more than 30 establishments given a rating of just one star – major improvement necessary – under the "scores on the doors" system launched by [Brentwood Borough Council](#) in partnership with the [Food Standards Agency](#) in February.

It gives restaurants, pubs, takeaways, cafes and other establishments that sell and prepare food a star rating of between zero and five, but many have demanded a revisit following a backlash of criticism over the scores, published to the public online.

The staff at The Bell slammed their low score, generated from an "out-of-date" inspection around a year ago, and were given four stars out of five after a revisit on March 15.

Landlady Linda Brace said the latest inspector had even apologised for the poor report given to them previously but, while they have been given a new, improved score, it has still not been altered online.

Mrs Brace said: "I have gone from more than 40 covers on a Sunday to six. It has devastated us.

A PIZZA takeaway is among the other establishments anticipating a much-improved hygiene score and plenty of stars to come their way.

Pizza Go Go, in Ongar Road, Brentwood, has been given the thumbs up for improvements made at the premises since it was issued with a zero-rating in the "scores on the doors" system.

Staff are now expecting to fly up the ratings when they are revisited in the near future as part of the joint [Brentwood Borough Council](#) and [Food Standards Agency](#) scheme.

Owner Ali Ashnaei said: "We have made all the changes which were requested in order to raise the score.

"The council have seen the premises and are pleased that their requests were fulfilled and have sent a letter to confirm this.

"All of the issues were of a technical nature and none were related to the food being served or hygiene within the establishment."

The takeaway is expecting a revisit in the very near future and then will be issued with a new score.

What Essex FSB would like to see is after any premises is inspected a standardised feedback sheet is discussed and then left with the food outlet owner showing what was good and what needs improving.

This fee is a total of a driver and vehicle licence, which attract different fees. A different set of vehicle licence fees are available for private hire booking only.   3. BUSINESSES from Billericay and beyond have stumped up more than £36,000 for charity, in advance of a well-known annual fundraising walk. Around a dozen companies and sole traders have contributed the record sum to the 'bonus pot' for this year's Fun Walk at Barleylands Farm. Following the event, which will take place on Sunday, May 22, the pot will then be divided between the 60 or so charities who typically take part each year.
 

The Fun Walk is the idea of Billericay's MP [John Baron](#), and has been staged annually since 2002.
